NEW FOR 1968

ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIPS—at a cost of \$1.00. This can actually be described as a gift or a donation as it does not entitle the owner to tournament participation but merely identifies the person as a friend of the game of horseshoes. I URGE you to ask your friends, relatives and associates in your everyday life to subscribe and help further to advertise the game of horseshoes throughout the country which is exactly what the NHPA will do with the money so collected. The NHPA has appointed Will Gullickson of North Dakota, to handle the nationwide publicity for us this year. This is an endeavor badly needed, as we all recognize, and worthwhile if we are to continue growing.

1968 MEMBERSHIP

Your secretary has the new 1968 cards. The cost this year, like most everything else, is up—NHPA \$1.50, STATE \$1.50—total \$3.00. The NHPA DIGEST (monthly magazine, is optional) at a cost of \$2.50, the same as last year. Each club will receive their cards very shortly.

COURT REGISTRATION

Something else new for 1968 is the registering with the NHPA individual and groups of horseshoe courts throughout the entire USA. The suggested fee is \$1.00 per court which seems nominal and all of the courts registered will be included in the DIGEST so people everywhere will know where courts are in the event they should be in your area or visa-versa. This facet is being handled by NHPA Ralph Dykes and such fees should be mailed to him at 433 West North St., Lombard, Illinois 60148. The funds so collected will be used to finance publicity nationally and improve the DIGEST.
